



Nursing Diagnosis Get inspired and support your clinical reasoning skills

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Abstract:

Nursing Diagnosis is essential for choosing the right nursing interventions in order to achieve the expected outcomes for which a nurse is accountable. Nursing diagnoses are used to determine the appropriate plan of care for the patient, driving patient outcomes and interventions. Nursing diagnoses also provide a standard language for use in the Electronic Health Record (EHR), enabling clear communication among care team members and the collection of data for continuous improvement in patient care. But it is not easy for nurses to give a clinical judgment about a human response to

health conditions and life processes.

In this webinar we are going to keep it simple. I will give you a four-step approach to have a start with Nursing Diagnosis in your own practice. Diagnostic terminology provides support to your clinical decision making through the articulation of diagnostic indicators. You can enable linkages to nursing assessment tools, thus improving diagnostic accuracy and your clinical reasoning skills.

I am advocating Standardized Nursing Languages of NANDA International Inc. and the Center for Nursing Classification and Clinical Effectiveness to incorporate truly patient-centric data with other traditional medical and administrative data to reflect the breadth of patient care and influence strategic decisions. The aggregation



of nursing data and the related nursing mappings will provide valuable clinical data sets. This will complement existing administrative data sets comprised largely of medical diagnoses, procedures and financial information.
